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Reception & Nursery Fire Service visit

Last Wednesday the children in reception and nursery had a very special visitor. We welcomed Gelvin Williams, a local firefighter to talk to the children about his role and responsibilities. He talked to the children about what the Fire and Rescue service do and how the emergency services can be contacted by dialing 999.

Gelvin said that his most common call out for fires was to do with people who are distracted when cooking and then things set on fire. He said that electrical fires were on the increase and talked about the importance of not charging devices such as mobile phones or lpads overnight.

Part of Gelvin's role is to educate home owners about the importance of fire safety. He talked about fire alarms and how to check they are working.

Mrs Bard got to try on some of the Fire PPE (personal protective equipment). The boots and helmet were very heavy and the clothing was thick and hot!

The children asked lots of really sensible questions and learnt where the nearest fire station was and a little bit of science about how to stop fires from spreading.

All children received a sticker and we shared the story of "Frances the Firefly" to highlight the importance of being safe around fires.













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Police visit: Keeping safe online

On Wednesday last week, the children in year 5 and 6 had an educational visit from police officer, Lindsay Dell. She spoke to the children about her role in the police as well as how they can keep themselves safe online.

She explained:

- <u>PEGI ratings</u> on PS4 and XBox games: These are in place to keep children safe. If children see and experience things which are scary or inappropriate, they cannot un-see them. This can cause worries and upsets for them or lead to confusion about appropriate ways to behave.
- APPs can also carry age ratings.
- <u>Did you know</u> that SNAPCHAT is rated as age 13+? This is because the messages that people send disappear after a short time and so this can lead to some people using it in an unkind way, believing that they cannot be traced.
- The age of <u>criminal responsibility</u> for children in UK is 10, and therefore anyone who sends
 threatening or unkind messages could be prosecuted for 'malicious communication'. She reassured
 them that the police do not want to prosecute children and give them a criminal record, but they want
 children to understand that the choices they make have consequences.
- The children learnt that the police can <u>retrieve messages</u> from SNAPCHAT or WHATSAPP. Even if you think they have been deleted or disappeared, the police have the power to get them back.

Staying Safe Online





Never give out your name, address, phone number, email, password or school



Tell an adult if anything makes you feel uncomfortable, scared or confused



Never send a picture of yourself to a stranger



Tell an adult if anyone online askes to meet you



Never open emails, links or files from people you don't know and trust



Never tell a stranger where you are going or what time



Always check with an adult before downloading



Don't use rude language online








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Top six tips

- Talk to your kids about what website/apps they are using, how they work, why they enjoy them and who else is using them.
- Encourage access to the internet from a family or communal room, it is not recommended to use devices in the bedroom.
- Check virus protection is updated on all computers and mobile devices.
- Sign up to your service provider's family filtering service, all the major providers now offer this service for free.
- Tighten up on privacy settings for websites and apps.

 This prevents inappropriate people from viewing or contacting children.
- Consider using parental controls on devices, which can limit the time used by apps/games or the internet.

We explored the sound the instrument makes and even used the slide, which everyone enjoyed.

Finally, we played along to "We will rock you" buzzing on the "rock you" part of the song. The children enjoyed being rock stars and turning their PBuzz into air guitars!
